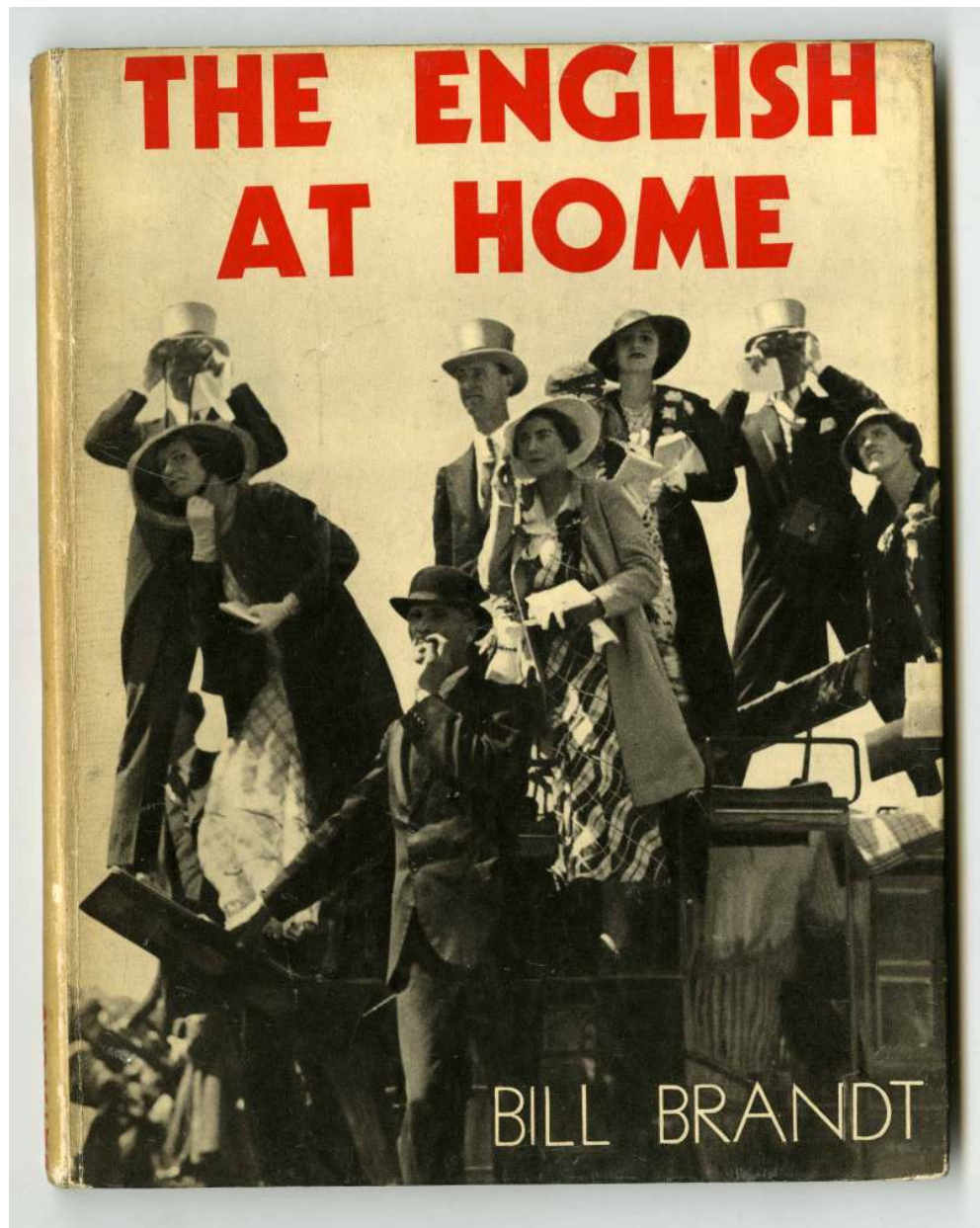

1. **[ATLAS]. DEAVÉ, Frank.** A manuscript atlas of France. [*France: circa 1822.*]

Oblong 8vo (135 x 213mm), 34 ll. comprising pp. [2 (title with manuscript text 'FRANK,' [*sic*], verso blank)], [4 (manuscript index written on rectos only)], and 31 manuscript maps drawn in ink over pencil underdrawing and coloured by hand. Original roan-backed, marbled boards. **£400**

A skilfully-executed, early nineteenth-century manuscript atlas, depicting thirty-one *départements* of mainland France.

First edition in Russian of *Realistic and Ideological Moments of Socialism*, in which Bernstein condemns materialism as a foundation of Marxist socialist philosophy and argues that socialism can be achieved without revolution. The original German article was published in 'Neue Zeit', No. 34, 27th May, 1898.

3. **BOWRING, Edgar Alfred.** An album of letters and papers.

37 letters, 28 autographs (often on envelopes) and 3 meeting agendas bound in a modern red half morocco folio album. One letter from Lord Overstone has a lock of hair attached. Approximately 80 pages, not counting address leaves; all in very good condition except one letter with some border tears and chips, and some small loss. **£3500**

This album contains several letters to Bowring concerning the organising of the Great Exhibition, and the running of the Royal Commission after 1851. Furthermore, there are agendas of meetings of the Commission (which Prince Albert has made sketches on), and other letters sent to Bowring in his different capacities at the Board of Trade. In addition to the papers of Edgar Bowring, there are two letters sent from Jeremy Bentham to Bowring's eminent father, Sir John. There is also a letter from Sir John to a friend sent while he was imprisoned in Boulogne and a letter from Sir James Emerson Tennent to the Earl of Dalhousie concerning political affairs, among others.

First edition. Brandt had already approached two publishers before Brian Batsford agreed to publish; an English edition of Brassai's *Paris de Nuit* had been published by him in 1933.

First edition. The *Supplement* forms a very important complement to the main work, though they are seldom found with it. The content was based on notes left by Chambers on his death, which were then expanded by the mathematician George Lewis Scott and others. The *Supplement* first appeared alongside the 7th edition of the *Cyclopaedia* (1751-2) and was then incorporated into subsequent editions, which were issued as four-volume sets.

Ephraim Chambers (c.1680–1740), apprenticed to a London cartographer, ‘was seized by the idea that Harris’s *Lexicon* needed bringing up to date and that he was the man to do this ‘work so seemingly disproportionate to any single person’s experience. A good French scholar, he adapted Moréri and Bayle to the common-sense climate of the English Enlightenment. Moreover, he introduced a novel device that has proved indispensable to every subsequent lexicographer and encyclopaedist, namely, cross-references; so that “a chain may be carried on from one end of an art to the other”’ (PMM).

First edition of this well-crafted epistolary novel in the cause of women's education, set mostly in Ireland. The attribution to Scargill is implausible – the Preface calls the work an authorial '*début*', but Scargill had already published several books. A contemporary Irish source names Chetwode/wood as author (see Loeber & Loeber).

First edition, a poignant collection of paintings of war-torn London by the Polish artist-in-exile Wanda Ostrowska, accompanied by extracts from her own writings and narrative by Viola Garvin.

Cochran was one of the leading lights of English theatre in the 1920s and 30s, discovering numerous talents, including Noel Coward, and revolutionising the London stage through his lavish productions.

DEFOE REVISED BY RICHARDSON

3 vols., 12mo, a very good copy in contemporary calf, gilt fillets on spines, numbered direct, covers scraped. From the library of Richard Moore (1716-1771) of Barne Park, Co. Tipperary, with his signature and note of purchase. **£950**

Second edition, 'the Alterations, Additions, Corrections and Improvements ... so considerable, that it may in a manner be look'd upon as a New Work' (Preface). Samuel Richardson, who printed volumes I-II (William Bowyer printed volume III), was almost certainly responsible for many of the revisions, although he had some collaborators. He also acted as editor for the later editions, and his name appears with Defoe's on the title-page of the seventh edition in 1769. Eaves and Kimpel point out some of the passages in this second edition that suggest his hand at work, such as references to his friends, a puff for his brother-in-law's bookshop at Bath, and a compliment to Edward Young. Where appropriate the second edition adds citations to acts of Parliament, which Richardson was printing at the time. It retains Defoe's format of describing the tour in familiar letters, unusual for a guide book but a device also much used by Richardson.

Early nineteenth-century russia, gilt, sometime rebacked, joints now cracking at head; bookplate of Robert Washington Oates, with his library stamps to title-page and penultimate leaf. **£500**

'Third' (second complete) edition. Sylvester's translations of Du Bartas' biblical epic *Les Sepmaines* began to appear as verse pamphlets in the 1590s and were first collected in 1605. The second edition of 1608 completed the text as far as Du Bartas left it on his death, up to the fourth 'day' of the second 'week'. 'Judith' translated by Thomas Hudson (first added in 1608) and the minor poems (added in 1605, partly omitted in 1608, including translations from La Noue and Du Faur as well as Du Bartas) are present here in full.

First edition, with a lyrical introduction and commentary to the plates by Sir Albert Edward Richardson, architect, sometime professor of architecture at University College London, president of the Royal Academy, and founder of the Georgian Group.

First edition. A beautifully illustrated manual and supplement on hairstyling and more by Gilbert Foan, the secretary of the Hairdresser's Parliamentary Committee and the president of the Hairdresser's Educational Society, with contributions by 'leading specialists'. The manual includes guidance for the administration or creation of delicacies such as 'The Eton Crop', the 'Shamrock Knot', yeast face masks, henna hair dye and cinematic make-up. Loosely inserted is a two-part lecture on 'The Pigmentation of Human Hair'. A fascinating resource for inter-war fashions.

A gorgeous production by a nameless Frenchman. France's *Le lys rouge* is a partially autobiographical tale of sensual-sexual tension, when the wife of a respectable politician has an affair with an artist.

First edition of a very early Wall Street novella, the fictional tale of Billy Hazard, an innocent carpenter's son from rural New York state determined to make it as a merchant in the city. Billy's attempts to establish himself in the mercantile trade in New York City are ultimately unsuccessful as his unhappy combination of gullibility and ignorance conspire to ruin him with a succession of three major failures. Billy's financial misadventures are perfectly illustrated in a passage recounting his foray into the Stock Market at the urging of his partner, his third and final failure:

First edition in book form (after serialization, mainly in the *Graphic*), second impression, with some corrections in the text and the date on the versos of the three title-pages altered from 1891 to 1892. The first impression, one thousand copies issued at the end of November 1891, sold out rapidly and this second impression, five hundred copies, followed in January. Hardy took advantage of the reprinting to make two corrections, including the notorious misprint 'road' for 'load' (III, 198) which ruined the sense and bothered Hardy considerably to judge from correspondence. In the final chapter (III, 275) he altered 'the sun's rays smiled on [Angel Clare and his sister-in-law] 'piteously' to 'pitilessly'. Other alterations correct slips of spelling and typography.

First and only edition, 'Special Edition', no. 28 of c. 500 copies signed by James Glaisher, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Palestine Exploration Fund on the limitation label on the upper pastedown. Hart's work was originally intended to form part of a *Survey of Eastern Palestine*, but only the first volume -- C.R. Condon's *Memoirs of the Topography, Orography, Hydrography, Archaeology, etc. [...], The 'Adwân Country* (London: 1889) -- was ever published.

THE FIRST 'LONDON COMEDY'

Third edition (first published in 1616 as *Englishmen for my Money*, and again in 1626) of this 'merry and bustling comedy of London life', the first of its kind.

The only extant independent work by the enigmatic Elizabethan playwright William Haughton (*d.* 1605), *Englishmen* was commissioned by Henslowe in 1598 and entered at Stationer's Hall in 1601 (but unknown in print until 1616). The plot concerns Pisaro, a 'Portingal' (*i.e.* Portuguese) usurer living in London, who wants to marry his three daughters to a Dutchman, a Frenchman, and an Italian. The daughters instead love three dashing young Englishmen, indebted to Pisaro after being swindled by him, and after much amusing trickery it is they who carry the day. The plot convolutions were familiar to Elizabethan audiences (*The Jew of Malta* and *The Merchant of Venice* are obvious parallels), but Haughton was the first to couch them in a distinct London setting, (and pair them with recognisable supplementary characters such as an Oxford schoolmaster and a typical comic buffoon), making *Englishmen* perhaps the first of what was to become the immensely popular genre of London comedies.

First Blake edition. Blake's plates were used once more, in 1807, in one of two rival thirteenth editions; the other thirteenth edition had the old Stothard plates, and the next edition, 1812, had no plates at all. Miss Flaxman's drawings were exhibited at the Royal Academy in 1800 and sold, with Hayley's manuscript, at Christie's in the Flaxman sale in 1883. This is a copy on normal paper.

First edition of this collection of assorted verses from the satirical master, Sir Alan Patrick Herbert. A long-time occupant of parliamentary circles, Herbert was an ardent supporter of legal reform, most notably of laws on divorce and obscenity.

The Times (14 August 1945) noted 'his individual niche in the parliamentary temple as the doughty vindicator of the private member's rights, including not least the right to legislate.' Deaccessioned from the House of Commons itself, this copy has an appropriately lawful provenance.

First edition of this presentation of the inter-war aesthetic of the new 'economical, unornamented form' (Hoffmann), revealed through numerous striking photographs. Contributors include Le Corbusier, Paul Laszlo, and Charles Holden.

First edition of an eastern romance in which 'there is not one soft scene of love, one sentiment of loose desire. Outrageous Virtue is never gratified with anecdotes of private Scandal; nor Licentiousness flattered with the sacred name of Liberty' (Preface).

A RARE, COMPLETE SET OF DAVID JONES' WOOD-ENGRAVINGS FOR *THE BOOK OF JONAH*, FROM THE ORIGINAL BLOCKS

Thirteen wood engraved plates by and after Jones printed from the original blocks on *japon* (290 x 220mm); a few soft, marginal creases; loose as issued in card portfolio lettered in green on the upper cover; portfolio slightly creased and rubbed at edges, otherwise a fine set. **£500**

No. xi of sixty sets of the wood engravings printed on japon. David Jones' illustrations were commissioned for the Golden Cockerel Press edition of *The Book of Jonah: Taken from the Authorised Version of King James I*, which was published in an edition of 175 copies in 1926.

No. lii of 75 portfolios. Douglas Cleverdon published *The Engravings of David Jones: A Survey* in an edition of 446 copies in 1981, and this portfolio of loose engravings with an accompanying letterpress index designed by Sebastian Carter was issued separately in an edition of 75 sets to accompany it. Since some of the portfolios have been split up during the last thirty years, the number of complete sets that survives is rather smaller than the limitation might suggest.

THE FIRST FOLIO OF BEN JONSON

Folio in sixes, pp. [10], 1015, [1], including the engraved title by William Hole (in Pforzheimer state A) but without the rare initial blank; some restoration to the blank margins of the title-page, and a longitudinal tear skilfully repaired (nearly invisible); long tear to E5 repaired, passing through a number a letters but with the loss of only one, a few tiny rust holes, light ink(?) stain on 3E3, but withal a fine, clean copy; handsome red morocco richly gilt by Bedford, gilt edges; armorial bookplate of the English explorer and writer on Africa Frank Linsly James. **£8,000**

First edition of one of the two great folio collections of Elizabethan and early Jacobean plays, a direct fore-runner of the Shakespeare folios. At the time Jonson was much derided for the presumption of the title, since the folio collection of *Workes* of James I were published in the same year.

The plays collected here include *The Alchemist*, *Volpone*, and *Every man in his Humour*, which was first performed in 1598 by the Lord Chamberlain's men, its list of 'principall comœdians' headed by 'Will. Shakespeare'. There are masques as well, including the masque *Of Blacknesse*, epigrams, and the collection of poems entitled 'The Forrest'. All the plays here are canonical, from authorised texts; the canon was completed in 1640 with the publication of a second volume.

First edition, an intriguing retrospective of political (and religious) infighting, anatomizing the pamphlet controversies of the last years of Queen Anne's reign.

First English edition (first published in French in Paris in 'An VI de la République', 1797-8). *The Travels of Antenor* is a work of fiction ('ne sont qu'un roman d'imagination'), based ostensibly on an ancient Greek manuscript found at the site, recently discovered, of Herculaneum. Antenor's adventures unfold against a backdrop of his thwarted love with the lady Lathenia, with whom he briefly travels and periodically corresponds, and it is not until her death and his eventual marriage to another that he is able to cease his wanderings.

He had hoped to join the proposed overland expedition, which Sir Thomas Mitchell, the surveyor-general, was willing to lead, from Sydney to Port Essington, but Governor Gipps refused to sanction a venture 'of so hazardous a nature' without the knowledge and consent of the Colonial Office. Leichhardt, irked by this attitude, chose to form his own private party of volunteers, funded by private subscription. As Wantrup states, '[Leichhardt's] *Journal* is one of the foundation stones of an exploration collection and every collector should acquire a copy' (p. 211).

This **unpublished manuscript**, containing transcriptions of highly important and private letters from four of the eight years that Philippe II served as Regent of France (1715-1723), represents a fascinating insight into the civic and personal life of one of the leading statesmen of his day. These transcriptions were most probably compiled by the orders of Louis Philippe I (1773-1850), king during the July Monarchy (1830).

The third volume contains a letter from the duke to John Law, who at the time was Controller-General of Finances. The letter is dated 7th December 1719, and in it the duke promises to continue sending Law letters concerning La Compagnie des Indes, the Mississippi Company. By mid 1719 Law had consolidated all of his business interests under this one title. The date of this letter marks the high-point in Law’s career as Finance minister; only a year later the Mississippi Bubble he had created almost single-handedly burst spectacularly, ruining both him and France.

What began with a one-off publication at the end of 1792 (*Evening Reflections at Westminster Abbey*) quickly turned into a profitable series, and Roach issued collected sets of his *Beauties ... in three Volumes* in 1793[-4], comprising the first 12 parts, and then in six volumes as here. Nos. I-IV are apparently found in several issues: here No. I has a later issue title-page (with a different vignette) and engraving, dated November 1794, Nos. II-IV have the running title 'Roach's Beauties of the Poets' added to the head of the engraved titles, and No. IV is dated 1794 not 1795.

The event is described as on the rise, with negligent accounting, fraud and deception as the most frequent causes. Sauter provides the plan of a fitting legal framework for dealing with bankruptcy, setting out proposals for the regulation of finance, sanctions for offenders, and a series of avenues which creditors might be able to pursue to minimize their losses. Daniel Sauter, a Dutch clergyman and man of letters, published in the same year a treatise on business ethics. An English translation (*The practise of the banckrupts of these times*) was published in 1640.

By developing these, it appears that the corruption of manners, the introduction of luxury, and the prevalence of tyranny and superstition, chiefly contributed to enervate, and undermine the old, as a wild unpolished spirit of liberty, gave an irresistible impetuosity, to the new.'

'It is likely that the detailed *Proposals* ... was prepared by Smollett as part of his editorial duties ... Just how much writing in these volumes is by Smollett is uncertain,

but he was supposed ... to have contributed the histories of France, Italy, Germany, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, and Holland. His work as a compiler cannot be determined' (*Letters of Tobias Smollett*, ed. Knapp, p. 78 n.2).

[...Spinoza] defends with eloquence the liberty of thought and speech in speculative matters, and the *Tractatus* contains the first clear statement of the independence of each other of philosophy and religion, in that speculation and precepts of conduct cannot collide' (*ibid.*).

'Increased anatomical knowledge and clinical expertise during the eighteenth century meant that physicians had a larger range of treatments which could be brought to bear on disease, but a healthy regimen remained the most effective means of staving off disease The way in which eighteenth-century physicians [still] made use of the Hippocratic Corpus found its most interesting expression in *A mechanical Account of the Non-Naturals*' (Madden, p. 158). Five more editions over the next thirty years testify to its contemporary importance.

First edition, presentation copy from the author inscribed 'To The Royal Society of Literature With The Author's Compliments'. The first exposition of Classical economic thought to appear in Turkish. The only comparable preceding work in that language, published 1852, had been a manual consisting of a summary of Say's thought. Charles Wells, an Arabist and Turkish scholar who worked in Istanbul and London, presents the thought of the British Classical tradition, for the first time introducing Smith's, Ricardo's and Mill's theories on value, work and taxation to the Turkish-speaking academic community, in a beautifully presented production, lithographed and designed to appear like an Ottoman manuscript. Wells' work was followed in the 1860 by a number of further publications on political economy in Turkish.

First edition of one of the earliest of Whitehead's works, the first attempt to tackle the question of the nature of the material world through the symbolism of formal logic.

'The importance of this paper is frequently overlooked or underestimated as an antecedent of Whitehead's later work. [...] In the paper Whitehead comes very close to enunciating a possible world view that bears a strong resemblance to the one that finally emerged in *Process and Reality* (1929). Whitehead wrote "On Mathematical Concepts" in 1905, at a time when he was two years into writing the *Principia* [...] Not surprisingly therefore much of the paper deals with logical formalisms' (R. A. Ariel).

In the same year, while working on the *Principia*, Russell also independently published a paper, *On denoting*. 'Both Whitehead and Russell, looking back later in life, regarded their respective essays as among the finest pieces of work they had produced (UW 466; LK 39). Both employed their common work in mathematical logic ... as a guide in the formulation of their respective papers. Yet because of the difference in outlook between the two men, one essay becomes a penetrating analysis of common language, while the other becomes a synthesis of possible world views and, indeed, a stepping stone to a cosmology' (Robert A. Ariel, *A Mathematical Root of Whitehead's Cosmological Thought*, 'Process Studies', vol. 4, no. 2, 1974, pp. 107-113).

First edition of Alfred Young's detailed essay on his experiments to determine the optimum feed for hogs, a unique piece of research for which 'the Society for the Encouragement of the Arts, Manufactures, and Commerce, adjudged the premium of a Gold Medal'(title). The nineteen experiments detailed (selected, according to Young, from many more actually undertaken) were carried out on animals of different ages using different combinations of foodstuffs, including pollard, turnips, milk and Jerusalem artichokes. At the beginning of the work, Young discusses the considerable mutual benefits that dairies and piggeries can bring each other.
